


A voice that roars for cats: **President & CEO Christi Metropole**

When I found a stray, needy kitten in 1998, I was appalled to learn that little to no resources existed to help her in a resource-rich place like Los Angeles. Not long after, I founded Stray Cat Alliance so that compassionate people would never again face those challenges alone.

In the almost two decades since then, Stray Cat Alliance has answered literally hundreds of thousands of calls,



Stray Cat Alliance has grown up to be much more than just a resource. Our mission is to educate and empower communities so that every cat is safe, healthy and valued as we build a No Kill Nation, one stray at a time.

This year's impact: In the pages that follow, you will see the record-setting year we had in 2018.

The longer-term impact of Stray Cat: The Stray Cat Alliance seeks to save America's most popular pet - cats - from the unwelcome distinction of being the most killed animal in US shelters. That's true even for kittens, the most adoptable animal on the planet. The great news is that Stray Cat Alliance's innovative, best practice programs have made a difference in outcomes for cats and communities beginning in Los Angeles. Now communities throughout Southern California and the rest of the country are asking Stray Cat Alliance to replicate its programs in their communities.

Cat people make it happen: We couldn't do it without the people of Stray Cat Alliance. In addition to about 25 full- and part-time members; and a eight-member national board, we accomplish our work with the help of more than 650 fosters, 350 volunteers and more than 8,000 donors. What you won't see in these pages are the hours of effort, the late nights feeding newborn kittens, the weekends checking on our resident cats; the thousands of miles driven to trap community cats for spay/neuter, get veterinary care and foster homes and more; and the countless hours of advocacy and education to keep the momentum moving ahead for kittens and cats.

It is with pride and gratitude that Stray Cat Alliance shares this 2018 Impact Report with you, our supporters and partners. We look forward to making the world an even better place for cats with your help this year.

Miaow Moments: Stray Cat Alliance's 2018 by the Numbers

1. HELPED Los Angeles reach a 89.7% no kill rate –

almost at the 90% standard for a no-kill community - in partnership with a city-wide coalition of animal welfare organizations

2. CARED FOR and spayed/neutered 3,788 cats –

27% more than 2017 and bringing our three-year total to 10,000+.

3. RETURNED to their homes 2.119 cats –

via Return to Field and Trap/Neuter Return – 22% more than 2017 - and 118% more than in Long Beach and Orange County. These cats would likely die in shelters without our intervention. Read more on Pages 6-7.

4. FOUND forever homes for 1.065 cats –

> up 22% over 2017 and 67% since 2016 through innovative partnerships with cat cafes; online adoption portals, pet stores and adoption centers; events, social media and with help from our supporters.

5. SAVED the lives of 749 or 25% of newborn, unweaned kittens

surrendered at the South Los Angeles shelter through Safe at Home – up 33% over 2017 and double those saved in 2016, the pilot year of this model program. Read more on Pages 6-7.

6. HELPED 10,416 people and 2,475 cats -

via our Hotline. 100% of those people got a response.

7. ENGAGED more than 650 fosters

including hundreds in South LA - many requiring bottle feeding every two hours. This is how you change the world for animals - by engaging new people in underserved neighborhoods to become friends and ultimately animal advocates.

8. DISTRIBUTED 20,808 meals

to 80 feeders for an estimated 1,034 community cats in South Los Angeles and beyond.

9. PERFORMED thousands of medical procedures,

vet visits and surgeries - in addition to spay/ neuters - for cats in our care. We save many cats other organizations can't or won't.

Our model programs can save 30%-60% of cats impounded in shelters

An estimated 860,000 cats were killed in US shelters in 2016. Two of Stray Cat Alliance's model programs can save an estimated 30% to 60% of the cat population in municipal shelters. Newborn, unweaned kittens are estimated to be 20% to 40% of most municipal shelter's population. Community cats are estimated to be 10% to 20%. These are the best estimates available from our partners and other animal welfare groups.

Stray Cat Alliance began an apprenticeship program in 2018 with support from Maddie's Fund and continues to be asked to replicate these programs in high-kill shelters in Southern California and across the country.

Think of the lives we could save if we could expand these programs.

Safe At Home

What it is: This innovative Stray Cat Alliance program saves the lives of kittens, who are the most often killed in shelters.

Why it's important: Unweaned, newborn kittens are an estimated 20% to 40% of the cats impounded in municipal shelters. If they require bottle feeding and no one fosters them immediately, the kittens are killed.

How Stray Cat's program works:

Safe at Home empowers people to be part of the movement to save animal lives by supporting them as foster care givers. Stray Cat Alliance community engagement counselors intercept people before kittens are impounded and then mentor and support people as fosters providing training on bottle feeding, supplying food and medical services as needed and through adoption.





Since its inception three years ago, almost 500 South Los Angeles community members have become fosters. This is how you truly change the world for animals - by engaging new people in underserved neighborhoods to become friends and ultimately animal advocates.

What's Unique: This is perhaps the only or one of the few programs of its kind in the United States. It shouldn't be. We would like to expand to as many communities as we can.

2018 Outcomes: Save 749 or 25% of kittens brought to the South Los Angeles shelter -- a 33% increase from 2017 and double what we saved in 2016, the program's pilot year.

Return to Field and TNR saves community cats and reduces municipal budgets

What it is: Return To Field reduces the death rate of healthy community cats trapped and impounded at shelters.

Why it's important: About 10-20 percent of the cats impounded in shelters are community cats, who, if left alone, could have lived happily in their communities.

How it works: Stray Cat Alliance spays /neuters healthy community cats that have been impounded at the shelter and returns them to their neighborhoods. Ongoing education and outreach teaches the public about the importance of spay/ neuter of community cats through TNR and loosely or fully owned cats.

Hallmarks: Stray Cat Alliance's Return to Field program was the first of its kind in Southern California and among the first in

the United States. Stray Cat Alliance established its model program in collaboration with Long Beach Animal Care Services.


2018 Outcomes: 1,789 cats were returned to field and TNR'd in Long Beach and Orange County. Return to Field cannot be done in the City of Los Angeles because of the injunction, unnecessarily contributing to 1,528 adult cats euthanized in Los Angeles Animal Services shelters in 2018.





A record-breaking year of financial investment in cats

Stray Cat Alliance's supporters contributed \$3.4 million in 2018, an increase of about 70% over the \$2 million raised in 2017 and a 140% increase from the \$1.4 million raised in 2016. That money supports all of Stray Cat Alliance's work with cats and kittens.

Working to save cats – in Los **Angeles and across the nation**

National efforts:

- No Kill 2025 National Steering Committee
- Stray Cat Alliance expertise requested from communities and animal welfare organizations in Indiana, New York, Ohio and Texas.
- Presentations and panels at national life-saving meetings held by Best Friends Animal Society and Austin Pets Alive.
- Placed second in the national Saving Pets Challenge, fueled by the support of Stray Cat Alliance supporters who contributed \$122,000 during an online challenge.
- Began to scale our Safe at Home program nationally through an apprenticeship program created in partnership with Maddie's Fund. More than 20 apprentices from across the country spent a week learning how to implement the program and save more lives in their communities.




Supporters make an impact with their time and financial support
