## Staycee Dains Showed Her Admin & Animal Welfare Chops In Long Beach

Los Angeles (June 2, 2023) – Stray Cat Alliance applauds the selection of Staycee Dains as the new Los Angeles Animal Services general manager, which was announced Thursday.

"Kudos to the City of Los Angeles and Mayor Karen Bass for appointing a seasoned and effective animal welfare professional as the general manager of Los Angeles Animal Services," said Christi Metropole, President and CEO of Stray Cat Alliance.

"Thousands of animal lives and taxpayer dollars depend on LA Animal Services to effectively and innovatively reduce intake and euthanasia," Metropole said "Staycee proved herself an able, savvy leader when Stray Cat Alliance collaborated with her in implementing cutting-edge programs that reduced euthanasia to 9% for cats in Long Beach."

Stray Cat Alliance collaborated with Dains and her team when she was director of animal services for the City of Long Beach. Stray Cat Alliance is one of the largest animal welfare organizations in Los Angeles and among the largest feline-focused nonprofits in the country.

In fact, Stray Cat Alliance recognized Dains with its Impact Award in 2021 for her collaboration on the return to home program that helped the City of Long Beach achieve such strong outcomes for cats.


Los Angeles Animal Services is the second largest shelter system in the United States, after the Los Angeles County shelter. Although some progress was made in reducing euthanasia in the City of Los Angeles in 2021, the post-pandemic return to work led many pandemic adopters to surrender their pets and adoptions slowed. When adoptions slow, euthanasia increases in systems like Los Angeles city and county.

California has been the Number 1 state for cat euthanasia for the past six years and is one of the top two states for dog and cat euthanasia. Greater Los Angeles is where many of those deaths occur, according to the national Shelter Animals Count database.

- 44% more kittens and 18% more cats were euthanized in 2022 than in 2021 in LA Animal Services' six shelters.
- Deaths climbed 22% to 9,485 in 2022 as reported by the shelters and rescues in LA County that's three-quarters of all the cats who died in Texas' shelters, the second largest state for cat deaths.

Best Friends Animal Society released its <u>2022 data</u> this week. California is one of two high-kill states noted in the data set.
